‘How to overcome gaps of implementing biodiversity in EU policies – lessons learnt from transnational Alpine Space projects’

Should I attend?

Various sectors, such as land-use planning or agriculture, must be involved in order to ensure biodiversity. In many regions, the results of projects and studies are often not known or not directly applicable. How can the framework for a sustainable, efficient European environmental policy be improved? And how can the new EU funding programmes effectively contribute to maintaining biodiversity?

This workshop aims at addressing **biodiversity policy implementation gaps from regional to interregional level and delivering lessons learnt and hands-on approaches** during various years of working on transnational Alpine Space biodiversity matters. Policy recommendations will be presented that need to be implemented on EU level. A dialogue on EU level on how to overcome current difficulties that prevent an effective implementation of the existing policy framework can pave future pathways. Our greenAlps policy recommendations highlight that **policy gaps and needs will have to be met sectoral for successful biodiversity protection measures – so get involved in our cross-disciplinary exchange workshop!**

The INTERREG IVB Alpine Space project greenAlps was developed to capitalize results from former EU projects and to valorise them for actual and future biodiversity conservation policies in the Alps. The lead partner ‘ALPARC - Alpine Network of the Protected Areas’ as well as the project partners ‘Berchtesgaden National Park’ and ‘Research Institute of Wildlife Ecology (FIWI), University of Veterinary Medicine, Vienna’ will share their experiences gained and discuss with you new future ways of cooperation and biodiversity policy implementation.

What to take home: Which European instruments can be improved to facilitate biodiversity policy and projects?

EU environmental legislation, including biodiversity conservation, is comprehensive and supportive of conservation of biodiversity and ecological connectivity.

- But how to overcome the gap of target and recommendation implementation in member states?
- How to empower policies to reach legally binding enforcement mechanisms? Those that do (e.g. Birds Directive and Habitats Directive) are nevertheless insufficiently implemented.
- Most biodiversity policies do not sufficiently capture important issues like inefficient land use, low water quality, waste, air pollution, loss of ecosystem services, biodiversity, and fish stocks. How to overcome the gap of cross-disciplinary exchange on different policy levels?
- Key sectors (environment, agriculture, forestry, fisheries, energy, transport, construction, tourism, spatial/land-use planning) have conflicting goals and insufficiently co-ordinate actions. Integration of biodiversity targets into other (non-environment) sectors is patchy – how to move on?
- Years of experiences showed that a guiding, integrated, trans-sectorial landscape vision for the Alps needs to be developed, discussed and approved by policy makers and respective governments. Empower trans-sectorial environment policies – your future contribution.
- EU projects are still relatively abstract and local actors are not necessarily included. The demand for transnational collaboration in the above-mentioned topics requires political support at ministerial level and by regional administrations. What is your contribution for well-established and implemented EU projects on biodiversity?

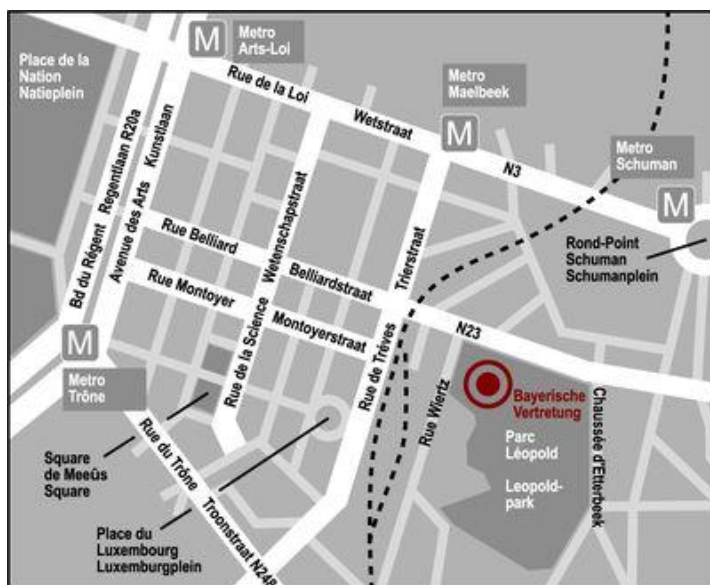
